

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR HEATHER

Are you exhausted? Have you recovered from Christmas yet? Yes, Christmas is a joyous season, but I often find that people seem tired by the time the new year rolls around. Christmas, after all, is a lot of work.

There are all those decorations to put up, and then pull down and put away. There is shopping to be done – whether in fighting crowds in stores, or scrolling on the computer and waiting for packages to arrive. There is financial maneuvering to pay the bills of Christmas, cookies to be baked, and exercise to be done to work off those extra pounds brought on by eggnog.

We Lutherans are not supposed to consider our faith to be "work," and yet we also seem to strive to work harder, faster, and better than our neighbor. So what if, instead of ignoring the word "work" completely, we instead put the work of Christmas into a different light?

In his poem "The Work of Christmas," Howard Thurman suggests that the birth of Christ is the beginning of ministry for all of us. Just like Jesus, we are called to heal, feed, and bring peace to the world. What if Christmas, rather than exhaust us with busy work, showed us the light and hope found in the work of loving our neighbor?

It can sound exhausting to keep up the pace of the holidays. So don't. Instead, look to what God has already done. Remember the hope of the world that arrives at Christmas. Let us work together; let us love together; let us live together as Christmas people.


The Work of Christmas


