A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR HEATHER

While Lent follows a predictable pattern of readings – moving us closer to the cross each week – this Lenten season has felt unpredictable in many ways. The transition from winter to spring has been a rollercoaster that has forced many quick wardrobe changes, and the tsunami of viruses that has swept through our community has made everything that much harder. Every day, it seems, a new challenge and uncertainty pops up.

We know where our Lenten journey is taking us with Jesus, and yet perhaps we wish it could be easier, less painful – even more joyful.

This year we will hear the Easter story from the gospel of Luke. Like Lent, the story of Easter is predictable in so many ways: an empty tomb, fear and confusion, followed by the unbelievable joy of resurrection truth. But Luke's telling of the familiar story asks a question that seems to be especially appropriate for this year in which we find ourselves. When the women go to the tomb and are perplexed that Jesus' body is not inside, two men in dazzling clothes appear and ask the women, "Why do you look for the living among the dead?"

The men's question is one of shock that plays off of what we know to be familiar. Yes, we the reader in 2025 know that Jesus is alive and not in the tomb. But we can still feel the grief of the women as they prepare to anoint a lifeless body. Why do they look for the living among the dead? It takes time for these women to truly understand the truth of what has happened in Jesus' resurrection.

Two thousand years and many readings later, I am asking myself the same question as the men ask the women at the tomb that morning. Why do I still look for the living among the dead? Why do I turn to old ways of seeing things, when our faith gives us new eyes? Why is it so easy to give in to despair, and let the "bad news" of the day overwhelm me? How could I forget about the hope we have found in Christ?

This Easter season, I pray that we all receive new eyes of faith. May God help us to see life in this world Jesus dies to save.


